

The Question of Identity: Ethnicity, Language, Religion, and Gender, Before Islam - Part II: The Concept of Ethnicity

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Lesson Plan 2: How Does Ethnicity Affect Middle Eastern Politics?

General Description of Lesson Plan: Students will analyze the effects of ethnicity on the politics and governance of nations within the Middle East.

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Subject Area(s): History, Sociology, Political Science

For Grade Level(s): 8-12

Time Needed: One week

Outcomes/Objectives:

Students will be able to identify specific instances where ethnicity has impacted Middle Eastern Politics. Students will be able to recognize critical factors in the use and construction of ethnicity. Students will be able to address the role of power differentials in the creation of ethnicity.

Materials: See graphic organizer located at the end of this lesson.

Suggested Procedure(s):

Have students reflect on the group politics of the most recent local or national election and guide them in sorting out the various interest groups into a T-chart, with Republican on one side and Democrat on the other. Once you have created a list, help students see the larger connections, i.e. many religious conservatives vote for the conservative or Republican Party. In this way, the teacher helps the student to see the role of group identity, or ethnicity, as a potent political factor.

Once students have a grasp of this relationship, have them read the modules, focusing on the examining stereotypes sections and links, and analyze several of the pictures by answering the questions at the end of each section and completing a graphic organizer, see example. The graphic organizer should ask students to focus on the ethnic and political aspects of the reading, specifically the nations, religions, cultures involved and the ultimate effect on the

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history of that country. The teacher should take time to analyze at least one picture, focusing on the captions, as an example.

Evaluation/Assessment Strategies:

The students can use their graphic organizers to create a presentation about one of the guiding questions, which they can deliver to the class. This should be done as a small group project and the products can range from power points to brochures. Also the teacher should assign the nations to each group to avoid repetition. After all of the presentations are completed, the students should be asked to assess the role of Ethnicity in politics throughout the entire Middle East.

Use these guiding questions to spur discussion in your classroom:

- 1. How has ethnicity affected the politics of a Middle Eastern country?
- 2. Describe the variety of ethnic identities within one Middle Eastern country.
- 3. What is the role of religion in uniting or dividing political groups within the Middle East?
